## To continue to allocate credits from the Council's Strategic Mitigation **Decision made:** Schemes to planning proposals held on the waiting list, in validation date order, beyond the 31st October 2021. To allocate Phosphate credits from Council mitigation schemes strategically in order to ensure the credits maximise housing growth within the Lugg catchment. To progress a non-refundable deposit scheme for the future allocation of Phosphate credits with the final payment to be made prior to commencement of works as set out within the legal agreement. Reasons for decision: Since the European Court of Justice 'Dutch Case' ruling, planning consents in the River Wye are required to demonstrate Nutrient Neutrality. Herefordshire Council's Phosphate Strategic Mitigation now encompasses integrated wetlands and non-mains infrastructure upgrades, these schemes demonstrate a reduction in Phosphate entering the watercourse against which Phosphate credits can be traded to release housing within the Lugg catchment. To date credits have been released to planning from two mitigation schemes at Luston and Tarrington. With further schemes due to come on line to encompass housing growth during the plan period the Council now reserves the right to allocate credits strategically, thereby seeking to maximize the number of dwellings released through credit sales. Advice from Natural England confirms the Luston wetland is placed strategically at the top of the river Wye SAC, Lugg sub-catchment, which enables credits to be used for applications throughout the SAC sub-catchment. Tarrington is lower in the sub-catchment, limiting the use of credits to the sub-catchment of the Frome. The Council will now progress the allocation of Phosphate credits to planning proposals listed upon the published waiting list beyond the first phase; validated before 31st October 2021. Whilst continuing to allocate in validation date order, the Council will seek to allocate credits strategically from its mitigation schemes as it considers appropriate to maximise housing growth within the Lugg catchment. The Council has taken advice from Natural England and has now determined, given that a precedent has been set by wider Local Authorities, it will seek to commence trading of Phosphate credits via a non-refundable deposit scheme. The Council will secure a 10% deposit from the developer with the final 90% payment taken prior at the agreed date set out in the ensuing legal agreement. This would limit allocation of credits and would result in a shortage prior to further mitigation schemes coming alternative options considered and rejected: forward, resulting in a wider pressure around housing growth in the north of the county.
