This major investment in the market town has transformed buildings, restored local historic character and improved public spaces, helping to create a vibrant place to live, work and visit.



Collecting waste just got cleaner and greener



Two brand new, state of the art, all-electric Refuse Collection Vehicles (RCVs) have been delivered and are ready to take to the city's roads.

The city's vehicles are the first all-electric RCVs to join the bin lorry fleet in Herefordshire and are part of the drive to make recycling and waste collection in the county even cleaner and greener. They will help reduce both air and noise pollution in the city.

Purchased as part of the new recycling and waste collection services contract between the council and its partner FCC Environment, the two new vehicles join the other 26 new RCVs which are now collecting waste and recycling across the county.

The new e-RCV vehicles will be collecting from residents and businesses in Hereford as this area is ideally suited to the mileage range of the vehicles.

Hereford's historic Shirehall is about to be redeveloped, transforming this heritage building into a vibrant community hub and home to Hereford's new library and learning centre.

The new library will be housed in the iconic Assembly Hall, with the stage converted into a seating area for reading and events.

On the ground floor, a learning centre will include a digital lounge, sensory room, and training room, designed to support digital literacy, cultural programming, and wellbeing.

The renovated Shirehall will also offer versatile meeting spaces, skills development areas and unique features like hireable courtroom spaces.

Improvement works underway at Brookfield School

Building work is well underway at Brookfield School in Hereford, to provide modern learning and working facilities for students and staff at the special educational needs school.

The £4.5 million project began in the summer and will see the new

sports hall, teaching block and altered facilities that will open for use in just ten months' time.

The improvement works are part of the council's £12 million commitment to increase school places and provide high quality and sustainable education

facilities for children and young people in Herefordshire with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND).

The new facilities are expected to be ready for the new intake of students in September 2025.

A new employment hub for young people has opened in Hereford. Situated at 57-59 Blueschool Street, the Youth Employment Hub (YEH!) provides a one stop shop for careers and employment advice for young people aged 16 to 24 years.

Friendly advisors offer a warm welcome and free help and support to find opportunities in further education, training, apprenticeships, CV writing, volunteering and employment.

The Lumi Nova therapeutic app helps children to build confidence and learn lifelong skills to manage their worries and anxiety through an intergalactic adventure game.

The app is suitable for children aged 7 – 12 years who experience mild to moderate anxiety and is safe and secure for them to use.

Finding hope in Herefordshire

Herefordshire has a proud history of offering a warm welcome and support to refugees.

In March 2022, the Homes for Ukraine scheme was launched to help Ukrainian families forced to flee conflict.

Herefordshire Council responded swiftly, setting up arrangements for donations and support for both Ukrainian guests and their hosts. Since then, the scheme has helped 230 households host 830 Ukrainians in Herefordshire, each with their own story.

Maria and Alina's story

Maria arrived in the county in February 2023 with her daughter, Alina, who has disabilities. They connected with a sponsor on Facebook, who helped them secure visas and welcomed them into their home. However, as supportive as their sponsor was, the accommodation wasn't suitable for Alina's needs. Maria found a privately rented flat, but the stress of navigating support systems alone led her to consider returning to Ukraine, especially as Alina's health worsened.

A council liaison officer stepped in, helping Maria settle in by sourcing furniture, registering her with a GP, and connecting her to the Early Help Team at Herefordshire Council. When Alina became very unwell, the officer arranged translation support, helping Maria get Alina to hospital. Alina spent two weeks there, allowing doctors to assess her condition and make a referral to Birmingham Children's Hospital.

With support from Herefordshire Council's social services and local voluntary sector support, Alina is now attending school and thriving and her father has been able to visit.

Reflecting on their journey, Maria says, "I am infinitely grateful... Herefordshire is giving my daughter the chance for a full life."

Future success thanks to vital support

Our services for children and young people include providing care for unaccompanied children seeking asylum. The children and young people arrive with a complex range of needs due to their experiences and language and cultural differences. However, with the right help and support the children and young people can go on to live very happy and successful lives.

We caught up with Amar who has been in our care since arriving in the UK in 2017. Amar was born in Sudan but due to the threat of violence to young men he had to flee his country at the age of 16, leaving his mother and sisters behind.

He travelled up through Europe following friends he made along the way, until eventually he reached the UK where he was taken into our care.

Amar is now aged 23 and thriving after finishing university in September last year. He is a qualified accountant now living and working in London and continuing to study part time.



Amar explains: "I want to use my knowledge of finance to support businesses and maybe I will start a business of my own."

Although English wasn't Amar's first language when he first came to the UK, he is now fluent and it's accompanied with a beaming smile when he speaks to us.

Amar said: "I am really grateful to the team at Herefordshire Council and to my personal advisor, Kath, for all the support that has been given to me. I really appreciate that I've had someone to talk to at the council and to answer my questions when I need help.

"Without the support of the care leavers team I really don't know where I would be today and I can't thank them enough for what they've done for me."

Unfortunately the situation in Sudan has worsened since Amar left and he knows that at the moment it is unsafe for him to return to visit his family. Amar tells us that he misses his mother and sisters but he regularly keeps in touch with them and they are very proud of everything he has achieved since living in the UK.

Amar will remain supported by the Leaving Care Service until he is 25 although he will be able to call us for signposting if he needs it beyond this. However, we know that he is already finding his own way in the world.

We wish Amar all the best for the future.

Home Upgrade Grant - Libby's story

"My name is Libby, and I've had the Home Upgrade Grant (HUG) scheme carried out on my home.

"I had been keeping an eye out, but when I got a letter through the letter box telling me about HUG, I thought 'that's exciting'.

"I'm very happy with it, I now have green energy in my home and lower fuel bills

"I'm very glad I've now got green energy in my home, because that's something that's very important to me, and I'm sure others will feel that as well.

"I'd recommend it to anyone because it's made a huge difference to my home."

Although HUG is now winding down, the next big initiative is Warm Homes Local Grant.

Grants will soon be available for insulation improvements (for example loft and wall insulation), first-time double glazing and

doors, Solar PV and battery storage technology and clean heat measures (including air source heat pumps) in homes on and off the gas network.

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It's a smooth road ahead

You may have noticed more resurfacing work taking place on our roads recently.

This is thanks to an additional £8 million that the council is investing into resurfacing the county's highway network during 2024/25, with £5 million being committed to A and B roads and a further £3 million for C and unclassified roads.

So far this year over 17km of new and improved road surface has been laid – with a further 25km still to come!

Resurfacing is used on roads that are nearing the end of their



life or that may have significant structural issues.

It involves the removal of the existing road surface, work to the structural layers of the road and a new road surface being laid. It can extend the life of a road by up to 15-25 years.

Further lengths of road have been identified for resurfacing following detailed and comprehensive

surface and structural surveys. These surveys help us to prioritise where we need to invest across our highway network.

It's important to do what you can to protect yourself and prepare to limit the impact of flooding on your property.

Develop your own personal flood plan

The Environment Agency have created a personal flood plan which you can download, print and fill in.

The plan includes a list of things you should do and provides space for you to note down important contact details such as your utility companies and insurance.

Keep ditches and drains clear Ditches and drains must be properly maintained to reduce the risk of flooding. If you're the owner of land or property that adjoins a watercourse, such as a brook, stream or roadside ditch, you are what is known as the riparian owner and are responsible for its maintenance.

If an owner fails to look after a watercourse it can cause the condition of the highway to deteriorate and potentially cause flooding to properties, the highway or surrounding land. www.herefordshire.gov.uk/ flooding-2/flood-management/6

Stock up on sandbags or flood barriers

If you think your property may be at risk, get sandbags or flood barriers in advance. If you wish to keep a stock of sandbags, your local builders merchants should be able to help you.

Flood alerts

Monitor flood warnings and alerts for your area. Use the government's flood warning service.

You can get more advice from the National Flood Forum on how to protect yourself and your property if a flood happens.

The most important thing is that you and your family remain safe. If you are or somebody else is in immediate danger and need rescuing, dial 999 immediately.

Beneath the surface

Balfour Beatty Living Places (BBLP) are the council's delivery partner responsible for public realm services in Herefordshire. This includes maintaining our highways, public rights of way, parks and open spaces, street cleaning and street lighting.

They are a team of dedicated and hard-working professionals. We caught up with Colin Frampton Public Realm Supervisor, BBLP, to find out more about his work.

When did you get started?

"I started in March 1996 - so over 28 years ago. Back then the depot was on Grimmer road, which is where Sainsbury's is now."

How did you get started?

"I had recently moved to Hereford and was looking for work so one day I just walked into the Grimmer Road offices and basically asked if any jobs were available and it just so happened they were recruiting for temporary grass cutters for the season.

"I had a great time mowing grass on a brand-new ride on mower. Charlie my teammate insisted that he did all the strimming which was fine by me!

"The season ended and with that the team was asked if anyone wanted to stay on as part of the street cleansing team. I swiftly accepted as my son Conor was due to be born at any moment and that's the start of my full-time career."

How did you end up doing what you do now?

"I sort of fell into the role of a supervisor one day by asking if my



supervisor at the time needed help as he was looking a bit stressed. I started helping him with the day to day running of street cleansing and from there was asked if I wanted a promotion to supervisor which I keenly accepted."

What does a typical day look like?

"As a public realm supervisor in the street cleansing department, I have a great team of 12. Part of my role is to assist and support them in achieving their work in a safe and efficient way and to make sure everyone gets home safely at the end of the day.

"The day-to-day activities are surprisingly varied from the routine work that street cleansing do, which includes emptying on average 476 litter bins every day, road sweeping, collecting 70 plus illegal fly tips each month etc.

"We also have emergency clear ups after flooding and storms, helping with events such as the Christmas light turn on and recently we helped with moving some pews from Hereford Cathedral for an event they were holding. "Then there's lost car keys in bins and returning lost dogs to their grateful owners - all activities we have undertaken."

What do you enjoy most about your job?

"One of the seasonal roles that I take on each year alongside my normal job is as a winter maintenance driver, which I've been doing for over 15 years and still enjoy every minute."

What's the most difficult part of your job?

"Some days can be challenging but everyone has challenging workdays. I always have support when needed and encouragement from managers and the company."

What makes you proud?

"One of my proudest moments is my son Conor completing the Balfour Beatty apprenticeship scheme in 2015 and who is now in a supervisor role looking after nine operatives and sat only a few feet away from me.

"He says he will be bossing me around soon, so now I feel old!"




Streetlink is a website that anybody can use to report someone who is sleeping rough to support services.

Beware the five scams of Christmas

You need to be alert to fraud throughout the year, but especially at Christmas many of us spend more time shopping on-line.

Five scams to look out for over Christmas are:

1. Online shopping scams -

Shopping on the internet can be very convenient, especially when the shops are busy at Christmas. But be careful when you give your credit or debit card details on the internet and always check that the company has a secure site. Try to trade with well-known companies, or those that you have done business with before, or that have been recommended to you

year you're more likely to receive

messages and emails offering deals, sales and bargains. Don't click on links as scam emails may lead to a fake website designed to steal your bank and other details. Ideally, type in the name of a website you want to visit. Or you can check a website at getsafeonline.org/checkawebsite

3. Fake social media accounts

- Social media is an easy place for fraudsters to operate by setting up fake pages or offering bogus goods. Search for officially branded pages to see if an offer or giveaway is legitimate, and never transfer money for goods until you are certain of what you are buying and it is from a trusted source.

2. Fake website links - This time of 4. Scam parcel delivery texts and emails - You may get an email or

text message saying your package has been delayed and it asks you to click on a link to track its status. This link could lead you to a fake site that steals your personal information, so do not give out any details.

5. Scam telephone calls - giving out your details in response to a scam email or text could lead to you receiving scam telephone calls pretending to be from the delivery company or from your bank. Never give out any personal, bank or credit card details over the telephone.

Avoid food poisoning this **Christmas**

With an estimated 2.4 million cases a year in the UK, food poisoning doesn't stop over the festive season.

To save you and your loved ones from a nasty bout of food poisoning over the holidays, the Food Standards Agency advises following the four Cs:

Cleaning

Keep your hands clean, especially after handling raw meat. Keep work surfaces clean and thoroughly wash chopping boards soon after preparing food. Wash fruit and veg before eating.

Chilling

Check your fridge is set at 5°C or

If your fridge is looking full, take out items that don't need to be chilled, such as unopened soft drinks.

Freeze any leftovers for future dishes.



Cooking

If your turkey is frozen, check the packaging for how long it will take to defrost. Plan this in advance, as a whole turkey can take 3 to 5 days to properly defrost Make sure your turkey, or any other bird you're preparing, is steaming hot and cooked all the way through. Follow the instructions for cooking times. Check the meat is steaming hot throughout, there is no pink visible when you cut into the thickest part and meat juices run clear. Cook the stuffing in a separate roasting tin. A stuffed turkey will take longer to cook and may not cook thoroughly.

Avoiding Cross contamination

When you are Christmas food shopping, take enough bags with you so that you can separate out raw and ready-to-eat foods. Keep raw meat and fish covered on the bottom shelf of your fridge so juices do not drip onto food below.

Don't wash raw turkey - it spreads germs further by splashing them onto your hands, clothes, utensils and worktops.
